How He Loves Us!

There are three core truths about God that are critical to our understanding. The first is that God is good. The second that God is loving. And finally, that God is in control. All three of these truths are interconnected, and without one the others fall short. If God is good, he must be loving. But if He is not in control, how can He really be good? And if He is not loving, He certainly cannot be good.

For the most part we all have a general understanding of the fact that God is loving. We all know John 3:16, and we often tell each other "God loves you!" But the question I want to challenge you is, how is God's love impacting your daily living?

The demonstration on the cross proves to us that God's love is true. Even if all He did for us was provide atonement at the cross, that alone is enough to show His love. Through answered prayers, encouragement from a friend, forgiveness from sin, grace to overcome, and faith to grow all demonstrates his unconditional love for us.

For this reason I kneel before the Father, from whom every family[

in heaven and on earth derives its name. I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God. (Eph 3:14-19)

The reality of God's love is something we need to understand. He didn't love us then and not now. He's not waiting for us to get over this current struggle. He knows what we're going through, and He sees our mess. Still choose to love us even after we failed. There is no sin beyond His love. He knows the things we've done, and He knows the things we've wanted to do. He saw it all coming, even the things no one else did, and still choose to love us. This is sacrificial love God has for us.

Many other parables depict God's love for us, and the value He places on each individual. For example, in The Parable of the Lost Coin (Luke 15:8-10) A woman searches her entire house for a single coin, and rejoices when she finds it. God's love is personal and unwavering–He values each of us deeply, and will stop at nothing to bring us back to Him.

This month, as we reflect on the theme, "He Loves Us Enough to Save Us," let us remember that God's love is not only a gift that we receive, but a love that transforms us. It calls us to love others sacrificially, to forgive them as we have been forgiven, and to joyfully share the good news of salvation. Let us remember that the love of Christ is ever-present and ever-willing to save. Whether you are experiencing times of joy or facing challenges, know that God's love is steadfast and unchanging.
